26th Sunday after Pentecost/Leavetaking of the Feast of the Entry of the Theotokos into the Temple/Hieromartyr Clement, Pope of Rome

Tone 1Troparion(Resurrection)

When the <u>stone</u> had been sealed by the <u>Jews</u>, / while the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure <u>bo</u>dy, / Thou didst <u>rise</u> on the third day, O <u>Sa</u>vior, / granting <u>life</u> to the world. / The <u>pow</u>ers of heaven therefore cried to Thee, O <u>Giv</u>er of Life: / "Glory to Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Christ! / <u>Glo</u>ry to Thy <u>King</u>dom!// Glory to Thy dispensation, O Thou who <u>lov</u>est of mankind!"

Troparion Tone 4 (*Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple*) / Today is the prelude of the good <u>will</u> of God, / of the preaching of the sal<u>va</u>tion of mankind. / The Virgin appears in the <u>Tem</u>ple of God, / in anticipation proclaiming <u>Christ</u> to all. / Let us rejoice and <u>sing</u> to her: / "Rejoice, O Ful<u>fill</u>ment // of the Creator's dispen<u>sa</u>tion!"

Tone 4 Troparion (*Hieromartyr Clement*)

O holy <u>athlete</u>, / thou didst gloriously amaze the ends of the earth with the <u>mir</u>acles Of God. / On the day of thy honored me<u>mo</u>rial, / beyond nature, thou didst cause the waters of the <u>sea</u> to withdraw / for those who came earnestly to the di<u>vin</u>ely-built church / holding thy precious <u>relics</u>. / After the <u>people left</u>, / thou didst wondrously cause the sea to re<u>turn</u> to the shore.// All-wondrous Clement, entreat Christ God that our <u>souls</u> may be saved!

Tone 1Kontakion(Resurrection)

As <u>God</u>, Thou didst rise from the tomb in <u>glo</u>ry, / raising the <u>world</u> with Thyself. / Human <u>na</u>ture praises Thee as God, for death has <u>van</u>ished. / Adam exults, O <u>Mas</u>ter! / Eve rejoices, for she is freed from bondage and <u>cries</u> to Thee:// "Thou art the Giver of Resurrection to <u>all</u>, O Christ!"

Tone 8 Kontakion (Hieromartyr Clement)

As a branch <u>bear</u>ing much <u>fruit</u> up<u>on</u> the earth, / propagated by the <u>cut</u>ting of <u>tor</u>tures, O as<u>ton</u>ishing one, / thou didst put forth ripe <u>bunch</u>es of <u>grapes</u> ever distilling the sweet-new vine of salvation, gladdening the hearts of the <u>faith</u>ful. / Therefore, as we <u>gather</u> to <u>keep</u> thy holy me<u>mo</u>rial, we rejoice and <u>mag</u>nify Christ. / O greatly-suffering <u>hierarch</u>, inter<u>cede</u> with <u>Christ</u> God// that remission of <u>sins</u> may be <u>grant</u>ed to those who celebrate the feast of thy me<u>mo</u>rial with love!

Tone 4Kontakion(Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple)

The most pure Temple of the <u>Savior</u>; / the precious Chamber and <u>Virgin</u>; / the sacred Treasure of the <u>glo</u>ry of God, / is presented today to the <u>house</u> of the Lord. / She brings with her the grace of the <u>Spirit</u>, / therefore, the Angels of God <u>praise</u> her: / "Truly this woman is the abode of <u>Heav</u>en!"

Luke 13:10-17 (Gospel)

Now He was teaching in one of the synagogues on the Sabbath. And behold, there was a woman who had a spirit of infirmity eighteen years, and was bent over and could in no way raise herself up. But when Jesus saw her, He called her to Him and said to her, "Woman, you are loosed from your infirmity." And He laid His hands on her, and immediately she was made straight, and glorified God. But the ruler of the synagogue answered with indignation, because Jesus had healed on the Sabbath; and he said to the crowd, "There are six days on which men ought to work; therefore come and be healed on them, and not on the Sabbath day." The Lord then answered him and said, "Hypocrite! Does not each one of you on the Sabbath loose his ox or donkey from the stall, and lead it away to water it? So ought not this woman, being a daughter of Abraham, whom Satan has bound – think of it – for eighteen years, be loosed from this bond on the Sabbath?" And when He said these things, all His adversaries were put to shame; and all the multitude rejoiced for all the glorious things that were done by Him.

Saint Clement of Rome was a contemporary of the apostles and one of Rome's earliest bishops.

Born into a wealthy and well-known Roman family, Clement was highly educated and raised in luxury. But he lost his family when his mother and brothers were caught in a roaring gale at sea and were flung by the storm to different places. His grieving father went off to look for his wife and sons, and somehow also was lost. Clement wanted desperately to find his family, and decided to travel east in his search. He went to Alexandria, where he met the apostle Barnabas. Later, in Palestine, he was introduced to the apostle Peter, and the two men struck up a friendship. After many spiritual conversations Clement agreed to be baptized by Peter, and became his follower. In the next years he accompanied the great apostle on his travels and helped in Peter's efforts to bring people to Christ, enduring with him his sufferings and imprisonments. As they traveled, Clement and Peter shared an extraordinary personal experience. They found Clement's mother, reduced to begging in an obscure town. Later they found his father. Reunion with his parents was like a release from prison for Clement, freeing him from the worry of not knowing what had happened to them. He and Peter rejoiced together. Peter knew that enemies of Christ were determined to kill him. He wanted to leave the Church, and Rome, in good hands. He and the other apostles made Clement a bishop. After Peter's death as a martyr, two men served briefly as Bishop of Rome, and then came Clement's tenure. He served brilliantly, convincing unbelievers to follow Christ and fearlessly proclaiming the faith. As bishop, he urged his flock in a letter to be willingly "imprisoned" or "bound" for Christ: "Let the one truly possessed by the love of Christ keep His commandments. What can express the binding power of divine love?" The emperor Trajan exiled Clement to Cherson, a place in the Crimea. There he met several thousand prisoners for the faith, Christians who had also been exiled and put to the arduous work of stonecutting at a quarry in the hot, dry land where water was scarce. They welcomed Clement and took strength from his encouragement and unshakable faith. So strong were his prayers that God revealed a hidden spring from which they could all take physical refreshment as well. Once again Clement brought unbelievers to the faith, in this case pagans who lived in the area. The stonecutting work led to the building of a church right in the guarry, and more were built in the following years. Clement was put to death by drowning in the year 101. It would be centuries before his relics were rescued from the sea, but their wonderworking power has healed and saved many other prisoners of unbelief and despair, leading them to certainty that the Kingdom is the place where all those in prison will be set free.
