A Lenten Thought

THE JUDAS SYNDROME

Judas had been chosen to be an apostle, to learn the mysteries of the kingdom of God and to proclaim them to the world, but he allowed other matters to catch his attention. On one occasion, it was the love of money; why waste precious perfume and not sell it for a good price, to help the poor? The passage adds that he controlled the funds and pilfered. The poor were only a cover-up for his greed.

Indeed, all the disciples expected Christ to act as a son of David and establish a kingdom. One can imagine the disappointment in Judas when the master unfolded an anticlimax – that the Son of Man would be arrested, beaten, and put to death by human beings. Thirty pieces sounded like a good consolation. He would at least have something in hand.

Judas had seen miracles, but they meant nothing to him. How can a master who performs wonders allow men to crucify him? At the feeding of the five thousand, Judas too had taken a basket and filled it with left-overs from two pieces of fish and five small buns. On the same occasion, he witnessed Christ walking on water, calming the wind, casting out a legion of demons, etc. The very evidence that made his master stand out as special in the world made no impact on his soul.

Doubt grows in soils that are not fertile. Judas' doubts and selfish motives led him to suicide. When we choose to stay away from church, what new habits do we establish? When we entertain doubts about a brother or sister and make inquiries into his or her past to satisfy our suspicion, what impact do we bring on our soul? When we allow our tongue to speak about others in noncomplimentary ways, whose grave do we dig? May the Lord our God be our Guide, this Lent, and protect us.
