A Lenten Thought

DO WE HAVE SINS OF IGNORANCE?

I Didn't Know! Am I Still Guilty?

Sins of ignorance are more frequent than sins we recognize. It is easy to say, "I speak as I see things," and imagine that this is natural. In ignorance, we may say unkind words and behave in ungodly ways. In the end, most people ask: Is it a sin, if one does not know and makes a genuine mistake?

There can hardly be a graver sin than gossip. It has the appearance of a harmless chit-chat over a cup of coffee or over the telephone, in the fellowship hall or at home; but its essence is the destruction of the image of God in a brother or sister. It tears down the fabric of unity, which is vital in Christ's body. It takes but a comment to make us believe that we have been lied to. If we, in turn, allow the grapevine to carry this news to other people, we become servants of the Devil, inspiring coldness and suspicion in Christ's body.

Another thread concerns those who, for reasons unknown to us, have stopped attending church. The grapevine finds ways to thrill itching ears with imaginative scenarios and fill the gaps with fictional stories that do not come from God. Rarely does one ask whether the gossip is true. The assumption is that those we trust know the truth and we trust them to convey it accurately.

There is gossip that the priest has tried to correct, but in vain. The grapevine gains its own momentum and follows its own course. It also has resilience, unless God intervenes with a new opportunity and a time for change.

The church can only remind its members that this is the Lent of the Faithful.-- the time to cry out: "Show me thy ways, O Lord, teach me thy commandments. Forgive our trespasses, both voluntary and involuntary. This includes sins committed in knowledge and sins of ignorance – because all sin proclaims us guilty.
